**Patrícia Reis's** most recent work is *The Disobedient*, a biography of Maria Teresa Horta, published in 2024. Horta is the only surviving author of the well-known “Three Marias,” the trio of intrepid writers who authored the *Novas Cartas Portuguesas (New Portuguese Letters)*, the feminist manifesto that echoed around the world and scandalized the Portuguese dictatorship. The story of Horta, whose art and activism stood out in a deeply patriarchal time and context promises to continue inspiring new generations of women. Reis is also the editor of *Egoísta* magazine, and the founding partner of the design studio *004*. She is the author of numerous acclaimed novels. She writes for the blog *Fictiongram* and for the newspaper *Expresso*. She participates weekly in Antena 1’s program *A Páginas Tantas* and co-hosts the podcast *Um Género de Conversa*. Previously Reis wrote

biographies of actor Vasco Santana, singer Simone de Oliveira, and journalist and writer Maria Antónia Palla. She studied history and has a master's degree in Religious Sciences with a dissertation entitled "The influence of biblical narratives on the work of Maria Teresa Horta". As part of her work as a curator, she was responsible for the exhibition of photo reporter Alfredo Cunha at the Eugénio de Almeida Foundation Art and Culture Center (March 2024) and will curate the exhibition of painter Ana Vidigal (November 2024).

Since its reopening on November 30, 2002, the **São Luiz Municipal Theatre** has established itself as a major presence in Lisbon's theater scene, with hundreds of performances per season between the Main Hall and the Winter Garden. The original theater was built in 1894 and then re-built using the original design two years after it burnt down in 1914.

**Chris Feliciano Arnold** has written essays and journalism for *The Atlantic*, *Harper's*, *The New York Times*, *Outside*, *Sports Illustrated*, *Vice News*, *The Believer*, *Folha de S. Paulo* and more. The recipient of a creative writing fellowship from the National

Endowment for the Arts, he has published fiction in *Playboy*, *The Kenyon Review*, *Ecotone* and other magazines. Along the way, his work has been noted in *The Best American Sports Writing* and *The Best American Short Stories*. He lives in the San Francisco Bay Area where he is Director of the MFA Program in Creative Writing at Saint Mary's College of California. English translations: *The Word Tree* (novel) Dedalus Books, UK; *City of Ulysses* (novel) Dalkey Archive, USA; *O Regresso de Júlia Mann a Paraty* is being translated in the USA by Elizabeth Lowe; Short stories in: *Two Lines*, *The Common*, *The Threepenny Review*, *A Public Space*, *Harden Ferry's Review*. Anthologies: *New Sudden Fiction*, *Best short stories from America and beyond*, W.W. **Emily Everett** is a writer and editor from western Massachusetts. Her debut novel *All That Life Can Afford*, inspired by her years tutoring for the wealthy elite in London, is forthcoming in spring 2025 from Putnam Books. Her short fiction appears in *the Kenyon Review*, *Electric Literature*, *Tin House*, and *Mississippi Review*. She is a Massachusetts Cultural Council Fellow in Fiction. Emily edits fiction for *The Common* magazine, where she has been managing editor for eight years. She also hosts the magazine's podcast.

**Richard Zenith's** biography of Pessoa was a finalist for the Pulitzer Prize in 2022. *Education by Stone: Selected Poems* by Brazil's João Cabral de Melo Neto won the 2006 translation award from the Academy of American Poets. In addition to his voluminous translations of Pessoa's work and the writings of other Portuguese poets, Zenith's fiction translations include novels by António Lobo Antunes, José Luandino Vieira, and José Luís Peixoto. Author of *Fotobiografia de Fernando Pessoa*, he has also published poems and a collection of short stories, *Terceiras Pessoas*.


**Casa Fernando Pessoa** is the house where the writer lived for the last 15 years of his life. The Casa is a three-story exhibition about the poet's life and work with a library specializing in world poetry located in the Campo de Ourique neighbourhood.

**Novuyo Rosa Tshuma's** first novel, *House of Stone* (W. W. Norton 2019), won the Edward Stanford Travel Writing Award and the Bulawayo Arts Award for Outstanding Fiction, and was listed for the Orwell Prize for Political Fiction, the Dylan Thomas Prize, the Balcones Fiction Prize and the Rathbones Folio Prize. Tshuma has lectured on *House of Stone* at the University of Oxford in England, the Nordic Africa Institute in Sweden, and Vassar College in New York. *Shadows*, her novella and short story collection (Kwela Books, South Africa 2013) won the Herman Charles Bosman Prize and was listed for the Etisalat Prize for Literature. Tshuma's second novel about astronomy and science, *Digging Stars* ("nuanced yet explosive" – *The New York Times*, "virtuosic" – Garth Greenwell, "utterly remarkable" – Chigozie Obioma) was published by W. W. Norton in September 2023. The recipient of honors including a 2017 Bellagio Center Literary Arts Residency and a 2020 Lannan Foundation Fiction Fellowship, Tshuma has taught at the Iowa Writers' Workshop and is an Assistant Professor of Fiction at Emerson College. **Ana Paula Ribeiro Tavares** has published a number of works, including *Ritos de Passagem* (1985), *O Sangue da Buganvília* (1998, republished in 2023), *Ex-votos* (2003) and *A Cabeça de Salomé* (2004). Her latest book of poems is *Manual para Amantes*

*Desesperados* (2007) and her collected poetry has been published in 2023 (*Poesia Reunida seguida de Água Selvagem*). Her work has been published in anthologies in Portugal, Brazil, France, Germany, Spain, and Sweden.

In this talk, **Rui Vieira Nery** will discuss the tradition of protest songs among the democratic opposition throughout the Portuguese dictatorship, recalling the importance of the writers of the lyrics of the usage of the songs in the Carnation Revolution, which brought down the Salazar and Caetano regime fifty years ago. Nery holds a Licenciateship in History from the University of Lisbon (1980) and a Ph.D. in Musicology from the University of Texas at Austin (1990), which he attended as a Fulbright Scholar and a grantee of the Calouste Gulbenkian Foundation. He teaches at the Universidade

Nova de Lisboa, and is a senior researcher at the Ethnomusicology Institute–Centre for Music and Dance Studies and the Centre for Theatre Studies. A musicologist and cultural historian, he has published numerous studies on Portuguese and Brazilian music history and is a frequent guest lecturer at many of the most distinguished academic and cultural institutions in Europe, Brazil and the United States. A former Secretary of State for Culture in the Portuguese government and director for Culture at the Gulbenkian Foundation, he is a member of the Portuguese Academies of Sciences, History, Fine Arts and Navy, and in 2018 he was awarded the University of Coimbra Prize.

For more than a century, **Casa de Imprensa** has provided support and social services to its members and their families who are primarily journalists and other communication and audiovisual professionals; authors of scientific, literary and artistic works; and other representatives from cultural fields. With locations in both Lisbon and Porto, the institution will host DISQUIET in its English Press House.

**Katherine Vaz** is a former Briggs-Copeland Fellow in Fiction at Harvard University, a Fellow of the Radcliffe Institute for Advanced Study, and a recipient of a National Endowment for the Arts Fellowship, is the author most recently of the novel *Above the Salt* (Flatiron Books/Macmillan, 2023), a *People Magazine* Book of the Week, a Top 15 Pick of Good Morning, America, and a Top November pick on Goodreads. Her previous novels are *Saudade* (a Barnes & Noble Discover Great New Writers selection) and *Mariana*, published in six languages and selected by the Library of Congress as one of the Top Thirty International Books of 1998. Her collection *Fado & Other Stories* won the Drue Heinz Literature Prize, and *Our Lady of the Artichokes* received the *Prairie Schooner* Book Award. Her stories have appeared in numerous magazines, and she is the first Portuguese American to have her work recorded for the Archives of the Library of Congress (Hispanic Division). Vaz served on the six-person Presidential Delegation representing America at the World's Fair/Expo 98 in Lisbon. *Above the Salt* is forthcoming from ASA/Leya in Portugal, which also published a reissue of *Mariana*, currently in development for film with Harrison Productions.

**Ana Cláudia Santos's** first collection of stories, *A Morsa – Contos de Inocência e de Violência*, was released in 2022. She has translated authors such as Carlo Collodi, Giacomo Leopardi, Italo Svevo, Sergio Solmi, Carlo Levi and Fleur Jaeggy. She has a PhD in the Theory of Literature from the University of Lisbon and dedicates herself to the study of Giambattista Vico, whose autobiography she translated.

**FLAD's** headquarters are in a seventeenth-century historic house restored after the 1755 earthquake. The organization has been helping in its recovery and restoration as part of its ongoing mission to preserve national heritage. It is a fine example of the Lisbon architecture from the early post-earthquake years.

His stories have appeared in *A Public Space*, *Ninth Letter*, the *Paris Review*, and *The New Yorker*. He has degrees from Stockholm University and the University of Massachusetts, Amherst, and teaches in the BFA program at Northern Vermont University, where he is fiction editor at *Green Mountains Review*. He lives in Vermont with his family.

**João Pedro Vala**, the author of two novels *Grande Turismo* (2022) and *Campo Pequeno* (2024), was born in 1990 in Lisbon. He initially studied management, but in 2011, he swapped numbers for letters. He completed a doctoral thesis on Marcel Proust, in which he discussed how time, homosexuality, Judaism, and sadomasochism seem to represent Proust's vision of literature. He is a literary critic, editor, and translator.

**Jonathan Escoffery** is the author of *If I Survive You* (MCD/ Farrar, Straus & Giroux), a *New York Times* and *Booklist* Editor's Choice, an Indie Next Pick, and an International Bestseller. *If I Survive You* was nominated for more than a dozen prizes and awards internationally, including the National Book Award, the PEN/ Jean Stein Book Award, the PEN/ Robert W. Bingham Prize, the Andrew Carnegie Medal for Excellence, the Aspen Words Literary Prize, and the Story Prize, and was a finalist for the Booker Prize, the Dublin Literary Award, the PEN/Faulkner Award for Fiction, the National Book Critics Circle's John Leonard Prize, the Gordon Burn Prize, and the Southern Book Prize. *If I Survive You* received *American Short Fiction's* 2023 Constellation Award for a Story Collection and was named *Miami New Times'* 2023 Best Book by a Local Author. In 2023, Jonathan was named among the 36 Forces Shaping the Cultural Conversation by *Harper's Bazaar*. He was a 2021-2023 Wallace Stegner Fellow at Stanford University and received *The Paris Review's* Plimpton Prize for Fiction and a National Endowment for the Arts Fellowship in 2020. His story "Under the Ackee Tree" was among the trio that won the *Paris Review* 2020 ASME Award for Fiction from the American Society of Magazine Editors, and was subsequently anthologized in *The Best American Magazine Writing 2020*. His writing has appeared in *The New York Times*, *The Observer*, *The Paris Review*, *Oprah Daily*, *Electric Literature*, *Zyzyva*, *American Short Fiction*, and elsewhere.

In non-fiction, Brodie is looking for prose that is playful, forensic and exhibits a commitment to storytelling, such as the work of Janet Malcolm, Helen Garner, Tove Ditlevsen and Renata Adler.

**T Kira Māhealani Madden** is a hapa-Kanaka Maoli writer, photographer, and amateur magician. She is the Founding Editor of *No Tokens*, a magazine of literature and art, and has received fellowships from MacDowell, Hedgebrook, Tin House, DISQUIET, NYSCA/NYFA, and Yaddo. Her debut memoir, *Long Live the Tribe of Fatherless Girls*, was a New York Times Editors' Choice selection, a finalist for the National Book Critics Circle John Leonard Prize, and a finalist for the LAMBDA Literary Award for lesbian memoir. **Arthur Flowers**, native of Memphis, is author of novels and nonfictions, including *Another Good Loving Blues*, *Mojo Rising: Confessions of a 21st Century Conjureman*, and the graphicwork, *I See The Promised Land* from Tara Books, India. He is a Delta-based performance poet, webmaster of Rootsblog, and has been Executive Director of various nonprofits and the Harlem Writers Guild, NYC. He has been recipient of various awards including an NEA and The Blues Foundation's Keeping the Blues Alive Award, a distinction for which he is unduly proud. For many years he taught MFA Fiction at Syracuse University.

**Annie Liontas'** debut novel, *Let Me Explain You* (Scribner), was featured in *The New York Times Book Review* as Editor's Choice and was selected by the ABA as an Indies Introduce Debut and Indies Next title. Her most recent book, *Sex With a Brain Injury*, was published in January 2024. She is the co-editor of the anthology *A Manner of Being: Writers on their Mentors*. Annie's work has appeared in *The New York Times Book Review*, *NPR*, *Gay Magazine*, *BOMB*, *Guernica*, *McSweeney's*, and *Ninth Letter*, and she is a contributor to *Tolstoy Together: 85 Days of War & Peace with Yiyun Li*. She served as Visiting Writer at UC Davis, University of Massachusetts, and Bryn Mawr College before joining George Washington University. Annie has served as a mentor for Pen City's incarcerated writers, working with the Prison Writing Project at the Connally Maximum Security Penitentiary. *The Gloss*, her interview series with women and non-binary writers, is running at *BOMB*, *The Believer*, *Electric Literature*, *The Rumpus*, and elsewhere.

**Jeff Parker** latest work is the novella *G v P* (Panhandler Books, 2024). He is also the author of *Where Bears Roam the Streets: A Russian Journal* (Harper Collins), the novel *Ovenman* (Tin House), and the short story collection *The Taste of Penny* (Dzanc). In the past few years **Cyriaco Lopes'** work has been in the U.S. at the Contemporary Museum in Baltimore, at El Museo del Barrio, ApexArt and the America's Society in New York, at the Contemporary Art Museum in Saint Louis, among other venues. In his native Brazil the artist has shown at the National Museum of Fine Arts, the Museum of Modern Art of Salvador, and the Museum of Art of São Paulo. His collaborations with Terri Witek include Big Bronze Statues, chosen as one of the highlights of the 2009 season by *Time Out New York*, A Shelter on King's Road, and Uma Cosia N'Outra.

**Terri Witek** is the author of 7 books of poems, most recently *The Rattle Egg* (2021); *Something's Missing in This Museum* is forthcoming in 2023. Recent work has been featured in two international anthologies: *JUDITH: Women Making Visual Poetry* (2021), and in the *WAAVe Global Anthology* of Women's Asemic Writing and Visual Poetry (2021). She has collaborated with Brazilian visual artist Cyriaco Lopes (cyriacolopes.com) since 2005 – their works together include museum and gallery shows, performance and site-specific projects featured internationally in New York, Seoul, Miami, Lisbon, Rio de Janeiro, and Valencia. Witek holds the Sullivan Chair in Creative Writing at Stetson University, and with Lopes teaches Poetry in the Expanded Field in Stetson's low-residency MFA of the Americas. Their collaborative projects are represented by *The Liminal*, Valencia Spain.

**Dame Paula Rego** (1935-2022) is one of the most important Portuguese visual artists of the last century. Her paintings align closely with storytelling and literary works, including famous English and Portuguese novels and folk-tales, and incorporate themes of violence, feminism, and resistance to autocracy and dictatorship. Alberto de Lacerda, the poet to whom DISQUIET is dedicated, introduced Scott to Paula in the late 90's, and they became friends. Scott eventually sat for a portrait. In this multimedia talk, he will provide an overview of her work, talk about her importance to Portugal and beyond, and, of course, share personal stories and remembrances.

**Scott Laughlin** is Co-Founder and Associate Director of the DISQUIET Literary Program. He's been the recipient of a Gulbenkian Grant, and his fiction, non-fiction, and translations can be found in *Guernica*, *The Common*, *Post Road*, the *LA Review of Books*, and elsewhere.

Lucas Pires also won the prestigious Prémio Europa/David Mourão-Ferreira (Bari University, Italy/Instituto Camões, Portugal) in 2008. *Doutor Doente [Doctor Disease]*, a stories collection, was published in 2021 (by Húmus). *Ser ator em Portugal [Being an actor in Portugal]*, a non-fiction book (published by Fundação Francisco Manuel dos Santos), and *Faz diferença [The difference it makes]*, a picture book with illustration by Alice Piaggio (published by Bruuá), came out in 2022 (it won the international prize White Raven 2023). *Jacinto Manupela* is his musical alter ego (on Spotify, Apple Music, etc.).
